Chair's Comments



As I write this the rain is still coming down. It has not been the best summer, but I'm sure we can all remember plenty of past summer holidays sheltering from the rain with a pack of soggy sandwiches!

But it's not all doom and gloom as our green and pleasant land has been restored to us. The brown grass of last year is a distant memory, and the both the flowers and the vegetables are very happy with the rain.

Talking of gardens and their produce, it is the time of year to be eying up your best marrow, your most beautiful dahlias, your prettiest apples and many more, and hoping to outdo your neighbours to win one of the coveted prizes in the Autumn Show. Given all the rain this year, and the bountiful harvest that should ensue, there will be plenty of very good entries in the vegetable categories. Do your runner beans have what it takes to win the accolade of 'longest runner bean', or perhaps you are hoping to produce the heaviest marrow. Planning

We would like to point out that No Strong Views is one of only three choices that SODC gives the parish council. It does not illustrate tacit approval of an application. Typically it is supplemented with specific comments from the parish council highlighting areas of concern.

District Councillor's Commentary

One of the challenges that the current administration of South Oxfordshire District Council faced when taking over in 2019 was what to do about the council offices. Many of you will remember the former council offices in Crowmarsh were destroyed by arson in 2015, some four years previously. A temporary solution was to rent offices in Milton Park at Didcot, this cost about a million pounds a year. The new Lib Dem-Green administration needed to resolve this as the million pounds a year was a significant cost and unsustainable and was putting the council's finances at risk. Plans were immediately drawn up to resolve the situation, with options examined of rebuilding on the existing site at Crowmarsh, using land already owned by SODC opposite Didcot Station or using Abbey House in Abingdon, owned by the Vale of White Horse District Council. The last option was ruled out because it is likely that Vale District Council will dispose of it, and in any event there is not sufficient space to accommodate both Vale of White Horse and South Oxfordshire Councils.



The plan is now to build a new office in Didcot which will be able to accommodate the needs of both SODC and Vale, and which will contribute to the improvement of the character of the area. Until a year or so ago, the view that greeted one as you left Didcot Station was a scene of dereliction and decay, with a row of boarded up shops or offices, an extensive badly surfaced open car park and the Prince of Wales pub sitting isolated surrounded by parked cars.

New buildings do not come cheap, and this new office will be well designed and energy efficient, and well connected to public transport. It is now largely forgotten that a few years ago SODC was considering demolishing and rebuilding the offices at Crowmarsh because they were not "fit for purpose". I cannot now recall all the problems, but I think the heating system, ventilation and insulation was wholly inadequate, and so the building was either too hot or too cold, and also suffered from leaking roofs.

The new office, which is now close to final design, will contribute to the regeneration of a key part of Didcot, now our largest town, and will also provide for the needs of both South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse Councils. It will be owned by SODC and Vale will rent an element.

The building is now being designed as four storeys high, not five as initially planned, and still includes large 'living walls' which will align the building closely with the garden town principles and support biodiversity.

There are lots of positive reasons for choosing the Didcot Gateway site: its proximity to excellent public transport links, its location is close to the centre of the two districts, it's a sustainable option for the future both economically and environmentally and its land that South Oxfordshire District Council already owns, and it offers the opportunity to share space with partners.

Although I hope that by the time you read this, the issue of street food at the Greyhound in Whitchurch will have been resolved. The operators of the pub are legally obliged to have licences to serve street food as there can be issues about noise, litter, car parking etc. Although the licensing process is administered by SODC, this is done within the legal framework set by the government.

Unfortunately, the pub operator, instead of applying for the licenses has engaged in a social media campaign blaming SODC. I will not say more other than there is a lot of misinformation about, and SODC are keen to support this street food service, but cannot simply ignore national legislation.

Fly tipping is a problem that does not go away, but we have a very energetic and proactive officer who follows up on fly tipping incidents, appealing on social media for information about waste, as often offenders do a cheap job, e.g. clearing fence panels, and then dumping them. This has been successful and fly-tippers have been identified and then prosecuted.

I am pleased to say that the government has raised the maximum fine for fly tipping from £400 to £1000, and the penalty for littering or spraying graffiti from £150 to £500. The latter is not too much of problem locally, although litter is always with us. Not so easy to catch offenders.



Hardwick happenings by Miriam Rose, Estate Manager

As ever, much is happening here at Hardwick! The transition to the Estate becoming a community led charity is now in full swing, boosted enormously by the seven person Hardwick delegation's trip to the Community Land Scotland conference in Skye in June. The conference is an annual gathering of the many community owned Estates in Scotland, which now make up 3% of the country, and was hugely informative and inspiring for the group of tenants and management team who attended, giving us a renewed sense of confidence that our approach has great potential for the future of the land and community.

Last week's Henley Standard featured a full page spread entitled 'Heirs hand over Estate to community stewardship' which is our first piece of public coverage about the transition and points out that this will be the first community run Estate in England, following the success of the Scottish community owned land model.

We are also very aware that our surrounding local community are also key stakeholders in Hardwick's land and have valuable ideas and input into its future. Top title for Tolly

On 17th June Iain Tolhurst (Tolly) of Tolhurst Organic CIC was awarded MBE in His Majesty's The King Birthday Honours list for services to agriculture, and on 5th July the Soil Association presented Tolly with the Lifetime Achievements Award in the Best On Organic Markets BOOM Awards.

Tolhurst Organic was the first farm to attain the Stockfree Organic standards and Tolly's philosophy of a "systems approach" to working with soil, nature, biodiversity continues to inspire farmers and growers worldwide. He has pioneered many key techniques, including the use of green manures, intercropping and under sowing, functional biodiversity, alternatives to peat growing media and the use of woodchip.

However, Tolly's greatest achievement and impact, and that of the farm itself, is the knowledge and skills shared to over 200 trainees and volunteers across the years. These are people who will perpetuate the values of the farm, and in his speech at the lovely MBE party at Walled Gardens on 1st July, Tolly dedicated his award to them all and handed custom-made medals to those present.

Spotlight on..... The Real Tennis Court **by Tim Tomalin, Chair of The Friends of Hardwick Tennis Court**

The court at Hardwick is a favourite of many real tennis players throughout the world. It is visited often by players from Australia, France and the USA. The charm of Hardwick House and the Estate is admired by all. Prince Edward came and played on his world tour on behalf of the Duke of Edinburgh's award scheme. During the Ladies World Championships being held at the Oratory recently, Hardwick hosted the parallel amateur doubles tournament as part of the event.

The court was built for Charles Day Rose by Joseph Bickley in 1907. It is the third Rose court: Sir Charles already had a court in his house in Newmarket and the first one at Hardwick, built in 1896, allegedly proved too far from the house for convenience. Mr Bickley developed the formula for the finish of the walls and floor, and the technique for curing it that nobody has managed to reproduce. He took his secret to the grave, and "our" court is one of the few remaining Bickley courts with all its original surfaces intact. In 1989 The Friends of Hardwick Tennis Court was formed and made an agreement with Sir Julian Rose to have access to the court under licence, to play and maintain the court and its facilities. Over time the roof was fixed and lights installed, changing rooms and kitchen updated. Hardwick is one of very few regularly used privately owned courts in the world.



The game of real, or Royal, tennis developed from games played in the street where there was sufficient space, or we think played by monks in abbey cloisters, as the shape of the playing area suggests. Real tennis thrived until the late nineteenth century when lawn tennis was invented.

The court is laid out with galleries under a sloping roof, the penthouse, which runs round three sides of the court. On the fourth wall there is a short section set at about 45 degrees. This is a useful target as it sends the ball flying sideways across the court; quite alarming for anyone whose duty is to return the shot and isn't ready! If the player at the service end fails to hit the ball before its second bounce, the distance of the second bounce from the end wall is marked and a chase has been laid. The best chases are the ones nearest to the wall. After the players have changed ends, the new server serves and the new receiver has to win the chase, placing the ball closer to the wall. If the ball isn't going to make it then the server doesn't have to hit the ball to win the point.

Are you following? It has been said that it is like a cross between lawn tennis, squash and chess. And the Royal bit? Well, Henry VIII enjoyed the game and, it is said, every time he lost a point he invented a new rule to put things right!

The Dog's Nose, Knows Best in Goring Heath Parish Hall....

Have you ever wondered what your dog's nose is capable of?

Scent detection work is when a dog uses its sense of smell to identify and locate a particular scent, to the exclusion of all other scents. Dogs have a huge head start in this area because their nose is vastly superior to that of a human. Dogs are estimated to have between 250,000,000 – 300,000,000 olfactory receptors, whereas humans only have about 6,000,000. For most dog breeds, the olfactory sense is their primary sense and, is how they 'see' and process the world around them.

Humans have benefited from dogs' extraordinary olfactory abilities in areas such as Customs and Excise; police work; Search and Rescue; Medical Alert and in the hunting field.

Scent work is a wonderful way to collaborate with your dog in a fun and low-impact way. It is an activity that provides your dog with crucial mental stimulation (this means it can be extremely tiring!!) and a way to engage in natural and instinctive canine behaviours. It is accessible to dogs of any breed and age, and because it is minimal impact, it can be wonderful for dogs recovering from surgery or illness, or those who are becoming less active with age.

It is a fun, pet-dog sport that can really help to develop a dog's confidence and their sense of self-esteem, equipping them with skills that they can use to help them cope in situations that they might otherwise find challenging. It can really boost a sense of the human/ dog partnership, as we take on the privileged role of trusting our dogs and learning how skilled they really are. Of course, it is important to note that the human role in the scent work sport is very much that of the supporting actor: the dogs have all the natural ability!!




Scent work is now available in Goring Heath, as Cerys from Blue Lemon Dog Training has qualified with Scent Work UK as a level 1-3 instructor, and she also offers National Nosework Association Odour Recognition Train and Test.

Once teams have graduated from the beginner course, then the fun really accelerates!! The teams can participate in away days, where they may be searching farms; sporting venues; museums; boatyards and buses! They also embrace

games, including a canine "Cluedo"- inspired event where the dogs must solve the crime using their scent detection skills!! Recent beginner "graduates" have been from a wide range of different breeds , demonstrating just how many dogs can benefit from scent work.
