Chairman's Comments

As I write, Friday 12 April, it at last seems to be the first real spring day, and I look forward to a better summer than last year. The weather has resulted in many pot holes appearing, some quickly becoming dangerous, especially for cyclists, and it is good that the County Council has had some of them repaired recently. At the Annual Parish Meeting yesterday, County Councillor Dave Sexon told us that once a pothole is marked by paint, it should be repaired within 28 days, so it's now worth paying closer attention to when the paint is applied.

Dave Sexon is standing down as our County Councillor, and at the election in May there will be some fresh faces offering themselves for public service. Like the District Council, the County Council has reduced the number of councillors, so the Goring Division for the County now stretches from South Stoke to close to Emmer Green, and from Mapledurham to beyond Stoke Row, covering 7 parishes. As I understand it there is now "Cabinet Government" in Oxfordshire, so most County Councillors are little more than lobby fodder, with pothole management duties thrown in, hence the reduction in numbers. If you have ever experienced Oxfordshire Social Services, or wondered what the County Child Protection Service was doing in Oxford or read of the fiasco over the parking spaces in Henley or the current muddle of the Henley Challenge, and, further afield but still in the County, the wasted millions on the Witney Cogges Link Road it would seem that we need more democratic intervention in the running of the County, not less, and we need more people on the County Council prepared to challenge, to ask difficult questions, and people who are not bound by party loyalties to the party line.

I have always felt lucky that we had Dave Sexon as our Councillor, especially as he lived so locally, and I am sorry that he is not able to continue, and I thank him for nobly working on our behalf for the last few years.

Local Police Area Update

Generally the past couple of months have been quite quiet in terms of police jobs in the Goring Heath area. We had two quad bikes reported stolen back on March 14th from a property in the area. This was likely to have happened through the night, unfortunately there were no witnesses.

Across the Henley Sector there have been many shed and garage break-ins with tools, bikes and garden machinery stolen. If it is possible for the Parish Council to put the word out, please encourage the people of Goring Heath to review their shed and garage security, pay attention to any insecure out buildings and look to chain expensive items together such as bikes and expensive lawn mowers and trimmers.

We continue to have vans and 4x4 vehicles driving through the area touting for business, sometimes legally sometimes illegally. If you could encourage anybody who has a genuine suspicion about a unfamiliar vehicle or person acting strangely in the parish, could they please gain as much information possible in terms of person description or vehicle registration and phone into the police on the 101 number.

ENRYCH Oxfordshire

ENRYCH Oxfordshire runs a thriving project for the benefit of adults with a physical disability who live in Oxfordshire. We work with people from many of the small villages as well as some of the larger towns in the county.

Our members, currently in excess of 250, all have physical disabilities of some sort, whether newly acquired as a result of road traffic accident or stroke, or from disabling conditions such as Cerebral Palsy, Multiple Sclerosis or Arthritis. The shocking reality is that anyone of us can find ourselves with a disability. In a split second our lives could go out of our control and simple things seem impossible – it's very frightening. Our aim is to give some control back to people, supporting them to realise they have a life worth living and life can be fun and enjoyable.

We enable people with a disability to claim back a huge part of their lives and indulge in some of life's simple, but essential pleasures same as people without physical disabilities do. Most of us enjoy being social, whether that means something simple such as going to the cinema or the pub or watching football, and even taking part in activities like sailing, fishing, sky-diving or learning languages or history – anything able-bodied people can do we can enable our members to do too. They don't have to sit at home watching everyone else have the fun, they can participate and we'll enable them to do whatever they want.

Suitable and like minded volunteers are recruited to support individuals in following their chosen interests on a one to one basis. This may involve visits at home or trips out within the local community. A smaller number, who may not wish for a volunteer, are facilitated to join a local college or specialist club..

A donation of just £500 would support an additional physically disabled member, and their Volunteer, for a year, and would significantly reduce the isolation and deterioration brought about by the restrictions of a physical disability.

OWL Update

At the Annual General Meeting held on Monday 18th March 2013 in the Library the outcome of a meeting with officers of Oxfordshire Libraries was reported as follows:

The situation where community libraries would lose 50% of funding for staff had not changed.

Various alternative ways of dealing with the problem were put forward, some of which were being adopted by other community library groups. First the figures:

50% of the budget would buy 17.06 hours of library manager's time. (There are 40.49 hours of staff time per week, made up of manager, assistant and Saturday assistant, at varying rates of pay). The Library Service would want a manager to be at the library during public opening hours, which are 17 and a half per week.

Alternative strategies

- 1 23hours per week of volunteer time to make up the difference that is, say, 8 volunteers each week.
- 2 Replace hours by fund-raising. It costs £647 per year to buy one hour per week of library assistant time.
- 3 A combination of 1 and 2

Our discussions then centred on sources of funds, the role of volunteers, but crucially on the continuing role of the school and its use of the library. The Headteacher was supportive of the community use, concerned about safeguarding pupils and interested to invest and improve facilities.

Further discussions with officers will be arranged and also with Langtree School, and possibly later on a public meeting. This is the start of a very long process!

Oxfordshire Woodfuel Programme bulletin

<u>Chalara / ash die-back</u>: You will probably have heard about chalara in the news. It is a spore-borne disease which is expected to kill nearly all ash in the coming years. A small proportion – maybe one in 100 trees – will be immune. As ash trees come into leaf, it will become apparent if they have chalara or not. Signs of the disease include wilting leaves, brown veins in the leaves, and browning of young stems. Forestry Commission advice is not to fell ash trees unless they are ill: the felled tree might be in the 1% that are immune. Besides, the spores can travel huge distances so felling trees as a prophylactic measure is not effective. If you are aware of ash trees with chalara, <u>www.forestry.gov.uk/chalara</u> gives advice on what to do. they can be used as firewood unless the government places a special order on the trees that prohibits their movement.

<u>Time to buy firewood and stoves/boilers</u>: The woodfuel cutting year may be over, but this is the time to buy firewood and store it for next autumn, and also to think about installing a wood stove or boiler. The website <u>www.oxonwoodfuel.org.uk</u>, provides lots of advice on this, including information on the Renewable Heat Incentive and lists of woodfuel and wood stove suppliers.

<u>Woodfuel study visits</u>: There will be three woodfuel themed study visits in the coming months: on 15 April, 1 June and 8 June. The first and last of these will each involve a visit to a woodland, a wood processor and an interesting wood boiler. The 1 June event is a unique opportunity to visit a woodland in a Ministry of Defence site, and taste wild rabbit if you want. The cost is £25-£30 and numbers are limited. More information is at <u>www.oxonwoodfuel.org.uk/woodfuel-site-visits</u>.

<u>Logs for labour</u>: Thank you to everyone who contacted me about this. We have had five successful events this spring, and hope to roll out the programme much more widely next autumn. If you are a woodland owner who could use some free help with woodland management in return for people taking some firewood (labour for your logs), or if you would like to work outdoors in return for some firewood (logs for your labour), please get in touch with me. More information is at

<u>Firewood quality standard</u>: The Oxfordshire Woodfuel Programme is setting up a quality standard for small-scale firewood suppliers in Oxfordshire, called 'OxLogs'. It aims to provide transparency about the amount, type, length and moisture content of firewood, and in time improve firewood quality. OxLogs suppliers will state the amount of wood in 'cubic metres tossed' (tossed is how it comes off the truck; a tossed cubic metre is about 0.7 stacked cubic metres); type as hardwood, softwood or mixed; and moisture content as $\leq 25\%$ which is ready to burn, or unclassified which buyers would need to season themselves. Please ask your supplier if they provide OxLogs.

Messing about on the river

Last year, the Games Makers were lauded as making a tremendous contribution to the success of the Olympics. On the river Thames, volunteers were making a similar impact helping boaters at the 45 locks along its length between Lechlade and Teddington.

The Environment Agency, which is navigation authority for the Thames, is now recruiting for the 2013 season and are looking for volunteers who can commit to assisting at least one day a week between May and the end of September. Volunteers can agree their hours with lock keepers but need to be available at least from 11 to 5. Volunteers are particularly needed along the river between Reading and Lechlade. Volunteering is a great way to meet people and to find out more about the Thames, its history, wildlife and management. At the same time volunteers know that they are doing something worthwhile that is really appreciated.

Our Volunteer Assistant Lock Keepers work alongside paid lock keepers. They help boats pass through the lock safely: taking ropes, directing traffic, and operating sluices and lock gates. They help maintain the site:



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painting, tidying and gardening. They provide information to visitors, be they on foot or afloat, so that they can make the best of their time on the river. Visitors really appreciate the local knowledge that volunteers can provide.

All applicants are invited to an assessment at a local lock. Here they will have the role explained to them and be shown what it involves in practical terms. They will also be assessed to decide which site may be most appropriate for them and to ensure that they have the physical capabilities required. After successful completion of the assessment, they attend an induction course which focuses on safety and preparing them for the lock side.

On the lock side the volunteers follow a documented training programme before being signed off to take charge of the lock on their own. This will only be for short periods, while the paid keeper is at lunch for example. The volunteers are there to augment the service provided by paid staff rather than to replace them.

Volunteers are provided with some uniform and can claim mileage for travel to and from their lock (subject to a daily maximum). They also receive a monthly newsletter which keeps them in touch with what is going on along the river and other activities of the Environment Agency..
