### **Chairman's Comments**

#### Whitchurch Bridge Reopening

With the paint still fresh on the newly restored till bridge, it will sadly come as little surprise to many , that the Bridge Company has taken the first opportunity to increase the cost of crossing.

An increase of 50% from 40p to 60p is the proposal.

At present I do not believe a figure has been set for the "discretionary" toll amount.

It should be noted at this point that this "discretionary" sum does not directly relate to the local community who suffered through such an extended closure of the bridge this year, merely to regular users from far and wide.

The premise is that there is to be a 42 day Public Consultation. However the Bridge Company whilst at times engaging with the local parishes, rarely agrees to any compromise.

As a private, for profit enterprise, it seems strange that no additional share capital was raised in the run up to the bridge reconstruction, with the burden of repayment as ever simply put into the shoulders of users of the bridge.

I trust that if the Company is successful in winning financial support from Government to mitigate the additional costs of the overrun due to poor weather, that the local community will benefit through reduced payments and an extension to the timings of the Mortgage repayment.

The Parish would seek to ask for a Public Enquiry on this matter, and I would urge parishioners to write to the Secretary of State on their own behalf.

## Woodcote10k Charity Road Run 2015





Bringing cancer treatment closer to home

The annual Woodcote 10k Road Run is now being organised by the Pangbourne Rotary together with the Goring, Woodcote & District Lions Club and will take place on Sunday 11 January, 2015 starting from Woodcote Village Hall promptly at 10.30 am.

The main beneficiary for this charity road run will be "Hope for Tomorrow" as well as Rotary & Lions, National & International Charity projects.

By entering you not only help yourself but also the charities who will receive all the profits from this run, along with any sponsorship raised. As with previous years the course is on undulating by-roads, kilometre marked, and marshalled. The SEAA Course Measurement team has officially measured the course. 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#### Development at BP

The BP (Castrol) site has expanded steadily over the years, and it is about to expand again.

It is only a few years ago that the car park, which itself is relatively recent, expanded further into the field, and at that time banking, and some planting, was put in to screen the cars from view. The car park boundaries were defined by the fence that enclosed it, and the banking was made within that fencing.

The latest expansion, which takes the capacity up from 326 to 384, is going to be contained within the boundary fence, but this is at the expense of removing the banking, so that both the existing car parking and the new expanse is going to be highly visible, day and night from the road, as well as from some other viewpoints.

The Parish Council, and residents who live close by, objected to this expansion.

#### Impact on AONB

As a Parish Council, our main considerations in matters like this are the impact of local residents and the impact on the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. We have not objected to other developments within the BP site, and have been pleased when BP has altered design features to reduce the impact. However, it has become apparent that the use of the site is intensifying as it is no longer just a technical site but additional non-technical functions have been re-located there. So when we, in the past, have accepted the need for additional office space, we were naïve in not realising that this was going to followed by the car park expansion we are seeing now.

#### Banking


In this case, we accepted the annexation of more of the green area to expand the car park, but we also asked for the banking to be moved further out into the field, to the other side of the boundary fence. BP was happy to do this, as it would have reduced the impact of the development, keeping us happy, and would have saved the expense of removing all the soil. We had worked out with BP a solution that would have mitigated most of the impact of the development, and with which both parties would have been content.

However, the planning officers at South Oxford District Council decided that the banking was an "alien" or unnatural feature in the AONB, and that planting of some bushes would provide sufficient screening. We argued with them, but they refused to allow the banking to be moved, on the basis that this would extend the developed area of the site.

How it can be thought that an earth bank, which already exists, and which provides a function in screening the existing car parking, is an alien or unnatural feature while a car park for 480 cars is not, is absolutely beyond me. It is planning officer speak gone mad, so BP were, it seems, forced to put in the application which we opposed.

Once again the District Council has shown its complete disregard of its statutory duty to protect the AONB. The officer's report which went to the District Councils Planning Committee completely failed to mention the Councils duty to protect the AONB, and few members of the Planning Committee who discussed this, displayed any knowledge or consideration of this duty.

#### **Contrasting refusal**

There is an interesting contrast to what happened with the Sun Inn garden. In that case, again the planning officers recommended development, disregarding the impact on the AONB. Because of the weight of local opposition, Ann Ducker told the committee that the development of the pub garden could adversely impact the economic viability of the pub business, and with that argument to the fore the development was refused and then went to Appeal, and was refused. The Planning Inspector made the refusal wholly on the adverse impact on the AONB, and completely dismissed the argument about the adverse economic impact on the pub.

So it is clear that this District Council is out of step not only with the Parish Council, but also with local people and with government planning policy. The Parish Council will continue to fight to protect the Chilterns AONB and our parish against inappropriate development.

Integrated options include heavier glazed units which can be hinged or sliding, allowing you to open your windows. At the top end, custom made timber frame units and those highly rated by the BFRC<sup>2</sup> will be more durable and their airtight seals will further reduce heat losses. For the best visual match, align the glazing bars with those on the original window.

Existing windows should be repaired first when fitting secondary glazing and all units should remain closed in winter to discourage condensation on the primary window pane.

### Footway for Crays Pond

It has now been many years since we started building roadside footways, first from Crays Pond to Shirvells Hill and then from Whitchurch Hill past Hill Bottom to Crays Pond. These low cost developments are well used, and make walking these roads a great deal safer.

We have been keen to extend them, so were delighted when, in July, the Police Convalescent Home expressed strong support for doing another one to link Flint House to Crays Pond. Not only would this enable residents there to reach the White Lion, but also to access the local footpaths that cross the road at Little Heath. This support was backed up with an offer of funding.

As the Highways Authority, the County Council has jurisdiction and control of the road, and we have been struggling to get them to understand what we are trying to do and to assist us in this matter. No doubt the cuts in the County budget have made this difficult, but when there is the prospect of a benefit such as this at no cost to the County, it is a pity that we have not had more support.

I recently received an anonymous letter from a Whitchurch Hill resident concerned about developments near their home. The writer was concerned about changes of use and damage to the environment.

I have passed this letter on to the Enforcement Section of SODC Planning, adding the Parish Councils concerns about the same matter.

If there are issues of this nature, you can contact SODC enforcement yourself directly, through their website (Google **SODC Planning enforcement**) and, although they do take some time to respond, there will be an investigation in due course. Unfortunately, some of the issues that concern people are not covered by planning law, and enforcement can be difficult. But that should not be a reason for not pursuing the matter with SODC. You can report anonymously to SODC, but then updating you can be difficult, so using the Parish Council for this purpose is fine.



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generally more expensive from December to February.

People who buy oil now could also benefit from faster delivery times, as suppliers often have spare capacity before demand picks up.

It is also important to shop around for the best price. One of the challenges for heating oil customers is the large upfront cost so, if you have difficulty paying for your fuel on delivery, ask your supplier about flexible payment options.

Joining a heating oil club can help cut the cost of oil significantly. An oil club is a buying group that purchases oil in bulk on behalf of its members. The club is able to negotiate a lower price per unit of oil because it has more bargaining power. Many oil clubs also order from a number of different suppliers in order to get the lowest price.

Buying with others reduces the number of journeys suppliers need to make, which can mean lower delivery costs.

Many oil clubs already exist in Oxfordshire. The Oxfordshire Rural Community Council runs a bulk oil-buying scheme which you can join via its website at www.oxonrcc.org.uk

### **Thames Valley Police Update**

It has once again been a very busy month across South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse with our officers and staff having to deal with a wide range of incidents.

Tragically, one of those was the sudden and unexplained death of an 11-week-old child in Faringdon. The death is currently being treated as suspicious and a 21-year-old man from Faringdon has been arrested on suspicion of grievous bodily harm and is on bail.

Thames Valley Police have specially trained Family Liaison Officers who work with families offering appropriate guidance and support in these circumstances; these officers are currently working with the family of the 11-week-old child. It doesn't matter how experienced you are as an officer; dealing with the death of a young child is always extremely difficult and I am aware that many of those involved in the investigation have given their own children an extra special hug when they have got home.

I would like to say a particular thank you to the local residents who provided refreshments and support to the officers at the scene watch. I am aware that the officers involved were extremely grateful for the kindness shown.

In other matters, Operation Bullfinch has led to increased emphasis upon the police's role in protecting vulnerable people. Many of you will be aware of the recent opening of the Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub in Cowley, where Thames Valley Police works with partner agencies such as Oxfordshire County Council to share information and develop coordinated plans to ensure the safeguarding of vulnerable people. The protection of vulnerable people and managing the potential threat, harm and risk to them is now a significant part of our daily work and accounts for a large amount of our deployments. It is interesting that as crime has fallen we have seen a significant increase in calls for assistance. Many of these have been calls for us to help in trying to protect vulnerable people. These calls can range from people trying to find friends and family who have gone missing - often with dementia - reports of missing young people who may at risk of sexual exploitation, attempts to protect somebody who may be at risk of harm due to mental health issues, and calls for our assistance in protecting people from domestic abuse.

We are currently embarking on our own multi agency work with partners to tackle repeat domestic abuse offenders and support their partners.

The impact on the victims of these crimes is often incomprehensible; they often terrified to be left alone, frightened to go out of their own homes and feel isolated

and vulnerable. We are committed to protecting these victims and will continue to prioritise the support we provide to them. I lived in Abingdon for many years and it is a town that is particularly close to my heart. It is a town with really low levels of crime. I was therefore disappointed to hear that a young male was recently robbed in the town centre and his mobile phone and wallet stolen. Robbery is a violent offence and something the police take extremely seriously. Thankfully a witness was able to accurately describe the offenders to the police and we were able to find them hiding in nearby bushes. On arrest, a mobile phone belonging to the victim was found in one offender's possession. The offenders are currently on police bail.

Thankfully burglary to people's homes continues to be on the decrease although, disappointingly, between midnight and 6am on 20 November there were a series of burglaries in Wantage and Little Milton that appear to be linked. The Wantage burglaries took place in Manor Road where cash, jewellery and bank cards were stolen; Springfield Road where offenders removed car keys for a Mazda 6 Sport (reg YH58 YFX) which they subsequently stole; Newbury Road where offenders forced entry but nothing was stolen; and Woodlands Brook where the occupant found a male walking into the rear dining room. The offender ran away when disturbed. There was also a burglary on Haseley Road, Little Milton where the occupant was woken by loud noises and saw two figures run from the property to a four door saloon car. We are searching for a 30 - 40 year old male of stocky build, who was wearing a dark cloth flat cap, thick dark jacket and boots at the time of the offences. If you have any information that may assist please call 101.

The onset of darker evenings is always a time when we appeal to the public to take extra precautions with their home security. In particular, ensuring that if their homes are vacant in the early evening a light is left on a timer so that it does not appear empty to any opportunist criminal who may be walking past the premises. We are now busy preparing for the Christmas and New Year festivities and while our Neighbourhood Teams are getting ready to visit and support vulnerable elderly people who will be alone over Christmas, we are also preparing additional staff to police the night time economy.





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While our town centres across the district are all safe places in which to have a pleasant night out with friends and family over the festive period, we will be placing additional resources on throughout the Christmas period to ensure people feel safe and confident in their environment.

We are conscious that while most people enjoy a night out safely and sensibly, there are regrettably still a small number of individuals who can become violent after too much alcohol. They would invariably never behave in such a way when sober but become a different person after a drink. It is these people we will be targeting with our additional patrols. Unfortunately they often do not recognise the consequences of their actions until it is too late. Just one punch can often lead to unintentional serious injuries to a victim, and a life changing conviction to the perpetrator.

We are urging people to recognise that drunken violence is stupid, pointless and dangerous. We are encouraging people to think about their actions, drink a bit less, look after one another and most importantly walk away from any violence or aggression.

Our officers will be working with licensees, the district council and partners to ensure that a robust approach to policing the night time economy will be in place, with those who insist on behaving in an anti-social or aggressive manner being arrested and given a free night's lodgings and a conviction.

This month, together with many other colleagues and friends, I attended the funeral service of Chris Parker-Towle in Wantage. Chris was a larger than life character who gave over 35 years to serving the community as a police officer. He will be greatly missed and our thoughts are with his family and friends at this difficult time.

As I always point out, it is important to remember that we do live in one of the safest places in the country and we are less likely to be victims of crime here than almost anywhere else in the country. For this, I am extremely grateful to all our officers and staff and for your continuing help and support.
