Chairman's Comments

My commentary is obviously read in the best circles, as no sooner had the last Newsletter been published than the Prime Minister joined me in giving the County Council a kicking for making unnecessary cuts to the Council services.

It's a well known ploy of politicians to announce that swingeing cuts are needed, and then triumphantly announce that some threatened service has been saved; this time it's the Oakley Wood Recycling Centre that has been "saved", and so won't be closing as originally planned by the County Council. I am sorry to say that it's less good news on the buses, in that all bus subsidies are axed, so from April there will be no more 143 service.

We are planning to improve the play area at Garton End, replacing the fence with something more appropriate and stronger, and installing new and additional play equipment. We are expecting that this should attract grants from SODC and potentially other sources. Nick Elsome is running this project which, as is often the case, is taking longer and is more complex than seemed at first.

We have been successful in attracting a grant for doing some more work with the pond at Crays Pond. The water quality in the pond has much improved as a result of the measures taken to reduce the run off of water into the pond from the roads.

The promise of fibre broadband for Whitchurch Hill by the end of December now seems unlikely, as the new cabinets that are planned for either end of Orchard Coombe have not appeared. However, there is potentially good news, as there also seems to be a plan to install a cabinet at the top of the hill where the existing telephone one is located. This should mean that those parts of Whitchurch Hill that appeared to have been missed off the original plan, are going to get faster broad band at the same time as the rest of Whitchurch Hill.



Specialist helplines available in domestic abuse cases

Henley Citizens Advice is raising awareness of specialist helplines people can call if they suspect that someone they know is in an abusive relationship.

Although friends and family can provide a lifeline by encouraging victims to seek specialist help, Citizens Advice say they currently face difficulties in helping victims this way because most people in Britain do not feel equipped to help people who are suffering from domestic abuse.

Surveys also reveal that more than one in three people who have personally experienced abuse didn't tell anyone else. Victims are often too afraid or isolated to talk to others about their problem.

Henley Citizens Advice staff and volunteers are trained and supported to identify instances of domestic abuse with a simple but sensitive approach during face-to-face advice. The staff and volunteers are then able to provide support and advice to those who are experiencing, or have experienced, any kind of domestic abuse.

People who want to support victims of abuse need to know the steps they can take and where they can get specialist help. Citizens Advice is joining the national "Talk About Abuse" campaign so we can help ordinary people to know how to recognise abuse, talk about it safely and enable victims to make the right decisions for themselves.

If you are experiencing domestic violence or abuse, or you are concerned that someone you know might be in an abusive relationship, you can seek help by calling confidential freephone helplines. You can also get help and support from your nearest Citizens Advice, or call Adviceline on 03 444 111 444.

Is a wood burning stove right for me?

With their glass doors and sleek looks, today's high efficiency wood stoves can provide a visual centrepiece as well as winter warmth. However, there are practicalities to consider before buying one:

1. Do I have a chimney?

You'll need to feed a flue up a chimney or out through a wall.

2. Can I store the wood?

Do you have a dry space for a few cubic metres of wood? A tonne goes quickly in winter!

3. Am I fighting fit?

Lugging and/or splitting wood is hard work. There will be wood ash to clear if you are burning logs rather than pellets.

4. Will I use it?

A wood stove may be surplus to requirement if you have a good boiler and central heating.

5. Will I burn the right stuff?

Will the wood you burn come from a sustainably managed forest?

Logs for Labour is on again!

Would you like free firewood, or do you have a woodland that needs managing? The Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment's "Logs for Labour" programme aims to promote sustainable use of firewood by running events where volunteers help to manage woodlands in return for logs.

The events run most weekends in the winter, are about 3 hours long, and could involve coppicing hazel, thinning trees or piling up brash. All you need are sturdy gloves, shoes and a saw (only hand tools are allowed for insurance reasons)... or let us know if your woodland needs the help of volunteers.

Heat your home and save money

Are you having problems heating your house, or do you feel that you're paying more than you should? South Oxfordshire Citizens Advice is urging people to take action, cut their bills by checking that they are on the best possible deal, switch tariff or supplier, or take up offers of help to insulate their homes.

You could benefit from savings of up to £320 a year from energy efficiency measures, an average of £100 by paying by direct debit, and up to £200 by shopping around.

Citizens Advice has published new energy advice information and links to comparison tools. Visit www.citizensadvice.org.uk/advisernet/consumer/energy/energy-supply to find out how you can benefit.

Citizens Advice has also issued eight money-saving tips:

- Check your bills carefully and read your meter regularly so you can check that you're paying the right amount.
- Talk to your supplier if you think your bill is wrong or if you have problems paying. They will give you advice or talk you through repayment options.
- Make sure that you are on the cheapest tariff. Check with your supplier and use an accredited tariff-switching website to see who is offering the best deal. Most energy suppliers offer fixed price tariffs, i.e. the price of a unit of energy will stay the same for the length of the deal.
- If you use a pre-payment meter, remember that standing charges will be added daily, even when you aren't using energy. Check how much these standing charges are and keep your meter topped up to avoid unexpected charges.
- If you use heating oil as your main fuel, buy before winter and see if there are any local oil-buying clubs you can join. A scheme covering many local villages is the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council's Bulk Oil-Buying Scheme visit www.oxon.rcc.org.uk

- Make your home energy-efficient. Insulate lofts and cavity walls, install double glazing or use thick curtains to keep the heat in. Get your boiler serviced or replaced to ensure that it is energy-efficient. There are schemes to help pay for this and Citizens Advice can tell you about them.
- Save money and energy don't leave appliances on standby. Fix leaking hot water taps and turn off the light when you leave a room.
- Do a home energy check visit the Energy Saving Trust home energy check at www.hec.est.org.uk Use this check to get a full report with details of your home energy use and the savings you could make.

If money is tight, contact your local Citizens Advice. They can look into your situation and see whether you are getting all the benefits you're entitled to, or if you can get help paying your bills. 
Please note that this is not free salt for your own driveway or property, it must only be used on the road or pavement, as should the salt in the salt bins.

Season's Greetings!

I travelled into London on a Saturday earlier this month, braving the crowds and discomfort of a journey that I usually do five times a week anyway and desperately try to avoid at weekends. The reason for this apparent madness was a trip to see the new production of "A Christmas Carol" starring Jim Broadbent.

The play was excellent, funny and spectacular in equal measures, and although I am more than familiar with Dickens' original novella, the adaptation was different enough to hold my interest for the entire two hours. I mention this not as a recommendation of the play (which I wholeheartedly do) but as an observation on the demeanour of the woman I sat next to for the duration of the performance. Not once did I see this lady crack a smile, laugh, applaud or otherwise give any indication that she was enjoying being there. She appeared unmoved by the waves of jollity all around her and almost gave off an aura of severity and indifference.

My favourite line from 'A Christmas Carol' is spoken by Scrooge's nephew, Fred, as he tries to convince his uncle of the benefits brought by Christmas: "I have always thought of Christmas time," says Fred "...as a good time: a kind, forgiving, charitable, pleasant time: the only time I know of, in the long calendar of the year, when men and women seem by one consent to open their shut-up hearts freely, and to think of people below them as if they really were fellow-passengers to the grave, and not another race of creatures bound on other journeys."

And this to me summed up the essence of what I love about this time of year, in spite of the damp and mild weather, and the bleakness of the daily news and the incessant travails of the weekly grind. This concept of togetherness and seeing each other as "fellow-passengers to the grave" rather than hostile strangers is, for me, the true spirit of Christmas. Looking at life, and people, through such a filter can only serve to increase our tolerance and friendliness to each other, and bring truth to WB Yeats' assertion that, "There are no strangers here; only friends you haven't yet met."

So did I turn to the sour-faced, grumpy lady next to me and offer her a warm smile and festive greetings?

No. I just shrugged and dreamt about a large brandy at the interval.

But I did *think* about it. So in that failing spirit, I'd like to wish all you readers a wonderful festive season, a very merry Christmas and a happy new year.
