Chairman's Comments

In the wider world, events in the last year were more interesting than usual, and one thing that has struck me is how people in power have moved beyond the usual evasions and half truths that are normally associated with politicians to complete brazen lies, defended with all the vigour and indignation of some one who is speaking the truth. I am reminded of the line by Ralph Waldo Emerson, "the louder he talked of his honour, the faster we counted our spoons". Whether its Americans presidents and their teams or campaigners about Brexit, few of them seem to be able to distinguish between truth and lies, that latter now dressed up as "alternative truth".

What relevance is that to Goring Heath Parish Council you may ask; around here planning controls can mean big money can be made if you get round them, and where money is involved, deception and lies often lurk. The parish council has to consider planning applications that include all sorts of statements and assertions to demonstrate to the Planning Authority the reasons why an application should be granted.

Planning officers are too easily deceived, and as the Chairman of South Oxfordshire District Council was reported as saying in the Henley Standard, the members of the planning committee just follow the officers recommendation. I would agree with Councillor Harrison on this; my observation is that the Planning Committee has some members who exhibit ignorance of their own council's policies, ignorance of National Policy, and ignorance of the local area. I have heard members support planning applications because they favour the applicant, which does not inspire a great deal of confidence in how the whole process works.



Hold tight please! – Bus News





until 31 July, which will be the end of a 12 month period of support. We have persuaded Thames Travel to extend the service to Crays Pond and Woodcote, but only for the first and last journeys of the day. This is because the bus passes through Woodcote and Crays Pond en route to Whitchurch Hill in the morning, and returns back at the end of the day. Apparently doing this for the rest of the day is not feasible because of the driver's hours. This change has to go through the Traffic Commissioner, so will not be effective until 1 April

We have also been in discussion with a new operator based in Goring that has taken over a route from Goring to Wallingford. As a Community interest Company, it can receive more income from the concessionary fares than can Thames Travel, who is a commercial operator.

As we will not be able to support the 143 indefinitely, we have to look at and support other options.

End waiting at the bus stop wondering if the bus is coming misery!

One of the challenges of using the bus is wondering whether it is coming or whether you have missed it. If you are using the 143, there is a useful app for your phone called OXONTIME RTI. This is supposed to show the nearest bus stop to your location, as well as when the bus is due. It can also send you a text when a bus is due.

Road Closures and Disruption

M4 Junctions 12 to 13: Redhill and Dark Lane (Bradfield) - Bridge Refurbishment

Between February and September 2017 Highways England is undertaking essential repairs to two bridges which carry the M4 over Ashampstead Road and Dark Lane, near Bradfield in West Berkshire. This work will involve road resurfacing, replacing the central reserve deck beams, bridge joints and sections of the safety barrier. Work will primarily be undertaken during day time hours, however some activities will be carried out at night when necessary.

Traffic Management

In order to carry out the work as efficiently and safely as possible, the following traffic management restrictions will be in place:

- 24 hour narrow lane running in contraflow on both carriageways with a 50mph speed limit
- Overnight lane closures (Monday to Friday, 9pm to 6am)
- Overnight closures of the M4 between junctions 12 and 13 (Monday to Friday, 9pm to 6am)
- Daytime lane closures over weekend periods (9pm Friday through to 5am Sunday)
- Closure of Dark Lane beneath the bridge Monday 6 March to Thursday 4 May
- Closure of Ashampstead Road beneath the bridge Monday 13 March to Friday 26 May

Weekend Closures

During work to demolish and install the bridge deck beams, specialist working methods and equipment will be required which will include large cranes that'll sit across all lanes of the motorway. Due to this there will be a requirement to close the M4 east and westbound carriageways between junctions 12 and 13 for entire weekend periods (9pm Friday through to 5am Monday).

The weekend closures are currently scheduled for:

- Friday 31 March to Monday 3 April
- Friday 7 April to Monday 10 April
- Friday 5 May to Monday 8 May

During these closures a clearly signed diversion will be in place via the A4 (through Newbury, Thatcham and Woolhampton).

Confirmed dates for all closures will be displayed on signs along the M4.

THE HISTORY OF CRAYS POND

John Rodger, a long time resident of Crays Pond, has been monitoring the water levels and rainfall at the Pond, and has reported back that the last 12 months saw rainfall of 680mm and a variation of water level of 490mm. These figures provide a baseline for future observations. As we have greatly reduced the road run-off into the pond, we need to keep an eye on how the pond seems to respond to local rainfall. However, as further research by John has shown, the hydrology of this pond is more mysterious than simple rainfall levels.

In the 1950's, W J Hatt Ltd were contracted to remove excess vegetation from the pond. There was an emergent 'island' of small Willows in the middle and this was removed by encircling it with chain and hauling it out with a vehicle on the bank. By the following day, the water level had risen to a point where it overflowed the banks and flooded the bungalow 'Endeavour' on the opposite side of the B471. The level did not drop immediately and a relief ditch was dug on the east side of the road. (Source- anecdotal from an ex-WJH employee). This would all suggest that the pond is fed by water that flows southwards from the high ground at Woodcote, flowing beneath the porous gravel soil land above the impervious clay that overlies the chalk.

As to the age of the pond, John has turned up a reference to a 1670 property transaction that refers to a location "near to Goring Heath and near to great pond in the heath called Creyes Pond".(OHCRef E1/9/ID/12) We don't really know the origin of the name, but it may be a corruption of 'clay' as there were kilns working in the area as early as 1500. Eastfield Lane is also known as Potkiln Lane and there is, of course, Chimneypot Lane at Little Heath.

An old well once existed to the SW of the pond. Being at some 500' above the river, this well would probably have been in excess of 400' deep! In the 1940's the alignment of the

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crossroad was altered to its present position and this was filled in, allegedly with the butts of elm trees.

There still exists, in the deepest part of the pond on the eastern side, a brick structure that would originally acted as a sump from which water was drawn by way of the hand pump that is in place, having been recovered some years ago. The metal pipe that connected it was lost many years back.

Great British Spring Clean

Litter Blitz 4th March 2017

After the reduction in litter while the Toll, Bridge was closed, the road side verges are back to the condition they were before. Junk food leads to junk litter, so we have many coffee cups, fizzy drink cans, and burger boxes thrown out by passing travellers.

We have been holding a litter blitz for many years now, and if you want to join in to make our parish a cleaner and more civilised place, join in with your friends and neighbours, family and acquaintances on Saturday 4 th March between 10 and 12. Many hands make light work.

We provide litter pickers and bags, and the bags are left by the side of the road for collection later. Please meet at Crays Pond, or Hill Bottom Cross Roads or Goring Heath Old Post Office at 10.

A Threat to Householders

The Edible Dormouse, *Glis glis*, had been observed in the Woodcote area but has now been seen in our parish, where it caused not insignificant damage inside a house. These mammals, which are NOT closely related to our native Hazel Dormouse, *Muscardinus avellanarius*, escaped from a the Rothschild Zoo at Tring in the early 20th century and for years were confined to woodland in that area. However, they have in recent years expanded their territory.

The beast has a body length of some 5"- 8" plus a dark bushy tail of some 4"-7" so somewhat smaller than a Grey Squirrel. They are nocturnal and they hibernate between October and May.



The advice offered to tenants of the Coombe End estate by the National Trust is as follows -

- They are a serious risk to property and local wildlife
- At the first sign of Glis glis in a property call a pest controller who is registered with Natural England for the removal of Glis glis (not all pest controllers have this certificate so you need to request a copy of the certificate).
- Practical steps include removing creepers from the walls of properties, trimming back trees away from the property, picking up fallen fruit from gardens promptly, avoiding bird food spilling on the ground
- Do not encourage glis glis by feeding them and should not approach them as they do bite, despite looking very cute.
- Netting around the eaves and soffit boards has some effect at keeping them out

- They seem to be drawn to water tanks and it is important to have secure lids on tanks
- Electronic rodent devices do not work
- It is important to get on top of the problem early in the year before the breeding season. The problem was particularly bad last year as there was a good supply of food from the beech trees and a breeding bonanza.
- Glis glis are well known for chewing at electric wiring, creating a serious fire risk or, at least, expensive repair bills.

Avian influenza

For those in the parish who keep poultry and captive birds, this is to alert you to the fact that all poultry keepers – whether commercial farmers or those with a small backyard flock – are currently required by law to house poultry or otherwise keep them separate from wild birds. This is because a Prevention Zone is currently in force across the UK. This applies until 28 February 2017. This has been done to reduce the risks of the disease spreading, and to help protect poultry and captive birds from avian flu.

From 28 February DEFRA anticipate adopting a more targeted approach, with mandatory biosecurity measures across the country and continued housing or range netting in higher risk areas. Anyone planning to allow their birds outdoors from 28 February must take action now to reduce the risk of infection from birds being let outside by following Defra guidance. You can find out whether, based on current risk levels, you are likely to be affected using our interactive map. All poultry keepers are required to take steps to reduce the risk of infection via the environment, for example in wild bird droppings, by practising good biosecurity. You should do this even if your birds are inside. Further details can be found at www.gov.uk/guidance/avian-influenza-bird-flu




