Further to correspondence we have received and the response to the article about the play equipment in recent newsletters, the Parish Council would like to report on progress.

We have had 5 responses to the article which was prompted by an email from Adrian, who would like to keep the table tennis table and the swings, and think about replacing the climbing frame, the horse and the roundabout. He would also like to suggest wooden equipment would be more in keeping, and that we could look at Tickers Folly Field in Blewbury for ideas. Pangbourne Park was also cited as somewhere we could take ideas from, most especially the Witches Hat climbing frame and the zip wire. One of our younger correspondents asked for a skate/scooter park, and a plea was made to consult with the residents who live overlooking the area for their opinions and preferences. It was noted that we must keep the area free for football training as it was so popular, and that now we have provided the lovely goals, the little one may not be used as much and therefore could be replaced. Hedges - Householders' Responsibilities

Contrary to popular belief, there is NOT a time when it is illegal to cut a hedge. Assuming that the hedge isn't subject to restrictions resulting from grant, subsidies etc., then there are no legal restrictions on when it may be cut. HOWEVER, the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 states that one must do NO work that harms nesting birds or damages their nests. The presence of nesting birds in a hedge can be ascertained by examination and observation.

From a horticultural point of view, unless one requires the neatness of a newly trimmed hedge through the early summer, August or later is the best time to cut as there is unlikely to be much regrowth in that season.

From a conservation point of view, late winter is best as it will allow for the fruit within the hedge to be eaten by wildlife over winter.

Where hedges adjoin the Highway, then it is the owners' duty to keep the hedge from obstructing said Highway. THIS INCLUDES BOTH PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND ROADSIDE FOOTWAYS. Should these hedges not be cut by the owner, then the Highway Authority (OCC) will cut it and charge the owner. It will cost a LOT more than getting a local contractor to do it.

In nearly all circumstances, the Highway boundary is the roadside bottom of the hedge or roadside edge of a ditch.

The Lack of Standards in Whitchurch Hill

The village of Whitchurch Hill is going downhill. We had a lovely flower meadow curtesy of Castrol/BP however the person who cuts it every year cuts it too early. This year they have cut is so early that the flowers did not get chance to flower properly or set seed because it was cut in June. We have lost all the lovely butterflies and birds that used to be attracted to the flower meadow. A farmer may cut hay now but **NOT** a flower meadow.

Another part of our village which is a mess is the churchyard at St. Johns. The grass is now as tall as some of the gravestones. How relatives of those who are buried there are supposed to visit the graves of their loved ones? The elderly are really finding it difficult especially if they are unstable on their feet. St. Marys in Whitchurch is always regularly mowed.

Another issue that causes annoyance is those people who light bonfires during the day especially on summer days when windows are open or washing is out. Why not think of others and light them in the evening.

When you look at the recreational ground the children's play area has not been upgraded like other local villages. The equipment is in a sorry state. If you try to take your children to the recreational ground to play or run around they find it difficult due to the grass mowing's being left especially if they have an allergy to grass or hay fever.

The area around Tine Pits pond is no longer kept beautifully mowed nor are the grass verges. I used to walk my children to Crays Pond when they were small. I could not do it now because only a single track is mowed on the edge of the verge. Even I would feel vulnerable walking there because the traffic comes in so close to you.

There are two footpaths that are barely passable. There is one at the bottom of Bec Tithe and the other is the Bridle Path between Goring Heath Road and Path Hill.

It is a pity members of the Parish Council do not check around the village and see these things for themselves after all we are paying the precept. I know they reduced it this year but WHY? When it could have been spent improving things.

Response on behalf of the Parish Council

We both welcome and appreciate members of our community sharing their views on the parish. This is helpful as we manage the wide range of needs of the residents and of course, ensure we spend any public money wisely.

We were however disappointed that your correspondent did not feel able to discuss their concerns directly with a member of the council prior to writing the letter – we would have thought it only fair and reasonable to seek a balanced perspective prior to being openly critical. Equally, we are a tad surprised that your correspondent feels the need to hide behind the cloak of anonymity when we are genuinely open and responsive to comment.

Notwithstanding that, in the spirit of transparency to our community we would like to respond to your correspondents concerns directly.

Firstly, several of the issues raised are not actually the responsibility of the Council. The flower meadow at Castrol/BP is a private concern and John Hatt, who had the responsibility of mowing the meadow, has already responded to your correspondent's unreasonable criticism in the letter pages of the Henley Standard. His response is reprinted alongside. Also, as your correspondent might well be aware, the upkeep of St John's Churchyard is the responsibility of the Parochial Church Council and perhaps it might be only fair to approach them directly if there are any concerns. We know that the PCC would welcome volunteers with open arms to support the care of their church. Finally, the cutting back of any undergrowth that encroaches on public footpaths from private property is the responsibility of the County Council as the Parish Council has no power or right to go onto private land for this purpose.

Regarding the other points made that are actually the responsibility of the Council: firstly, the council pay considerable attention to the upkeep of the children's playground, ensuring regular safety assessment and maintenance. Your correspondent might also not have noticed the active communication over the last few months inviting comments on investing in these amenities and many parishioners have already contributed with their ideas; secondly, the Council does recognise the importance of upkeeping local pathways and areas such as the Tinepit Pond. We have a carefully specified contract with a local social enterprise organisation to regularly mow the relevant areas and we are monitoring their performance and regularly undertaking inspections. There is of course always room for improvement subject to spend and if your correspondent would like to discuss with us whether an increase in the council tax would be sensible and good value to further improve on this area, then we would welcome their contribution.

More generally, parishioners will appreciate that there is always a variety of opinion on priorities and the best use of the budget. We would reassure your correspondent that the council remains alert and committed to doing the very best it can for its community and residents and spending money sensibly. We would welcome meeting your correspondent as we would any of our residents if they have concerns at our monthly parish council meetings in Goring Heath Parish Hall which are held on the second Thursday of every month. Equally, individual councillors are always happy to be contacted and their contact details are openly available and published in this newsletter.

Encouraging Wildflowers—Letter reproduced from The Henley Standard

Sir, — As a former councillor, I read your correspondent BT's letter about her Whitchurch Hill concerns with interest (*Standard*, July 6).

Firstly, I would urge such an active and interested person to get stuck in, and try to join the parish council, so she can help improve things. Sadly, she will find councillors do not get paid and are seldom thanked for all their work. BT could also offer to help in St John's Churchyard — I know they are always looking for volunteers to managed both their well-kept and unkempt (wildlife) areas.

I am proud to say I am the farmer/contractor who has been employed by Bozedown House to look after their fields for many years. We not only helped establish the first wildflower meadow some 10 years ago but have hand-pulled the poisonous ragwort each year prior to cutting and haymaking to knock the seeds out ready for the following year. This has all been done with advice from reputable local ecologists.

This year, a second field has been soft landscaped and sown with a wild-flower mix. We were asked to cut earlier than usual to give the less competitive wildflowers a better chance to establish and check the bigger plants dominating the original field.

The current drought may well reduce the second flush that we had hoped for, which we had intended to cut again in August. But let's hope we get an even better display of wildflowers in both fields next year at no expense to the local people who can enjoy them and perhaps put a smile back on BT's face.

Bus Service

After a long struggle, Going Forward buses has had to curtail the 142 bus service, despite financial support from the Parish Council, and the daily service is now reduced to a weekly service on Saturday. There is now no service Monday to Friday, and on Saturdays there are three services into Reading (from the Sun at 10.17, 13.12 and 15.17) with a return service leaving Reading at 11.35, 14,05 and 16.20) There is also a service into Pangbourne at 9.35 from the Sun, the return journey from Pangbourne leaving at 10.10, and later returns from Pangbourne at 13.05 and 15.10. Some services now serve the Almshouses.

The difficulties of running the service cannot be under estimated. The geography makes the routing difficult, as the river acts as a barrier, and with there is no single direct route into Reading. At one time, Chiltern Queens ran a service from Woodcote to Reading via Goring Heath, but the Thames Travel routes from Oxford have taken the Woodcote passengers. The lack of patronage from our parish means that the service is not viable, and the final straw came when the regular driver, Derek, suffered a stroke and was therefore unable to drive. His absence had been covered by volunteer drivers, but that was not a sustainable option.

The Saturday service does provide a useful way to get into Reading, with options to have a quick visit, a longer shop or more of a day. A quick trip to Pangbourne is also possible. Benefits of the bus are saving your bridge tolls, or car park charges in Reading, and you get dropped off right outside Marks and Spencer.


It is hoped that the people who used the bus in the past will now use it on Saturdays, so that at least this service can prove viable.




