Chairman's Comments

In November, I commented on the situation in respect of the courtyard of the Almshouses, and since then the parish council has filed a complaint against South Oxfordshire District Council over its repeated failure to protect this Grade 1 Listed building, and the incompetence of its planning officers in this matter. The complaint, which ran to five pages of details and a further 45 pages of evidence, centred on the failure by officers to act properly in accordance with the legislation, principally the Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act 1990, and the National Planning Policy Framework, but also with reference to case law.

In his reply, the Head of Planning agreed with the complaint, and stated that "I acknowledge the flaws in the Council's past handling of this matter and offer my sincere apologies for those". The case is being reopened and we hope that there will be a satisfactory conclusion.

In all of this matter, our District Councillor, Rob Simister, appeared to be completely dis-interested, as too often been the case in recent years, unlike in the past where we had such good local Councillors as Mrs Deborah Whitfeld or Mrs Anne Ducker. Mrs Whitfeld was also on the parish council, and Mrs Ducker would make every effort to attend our meetings. Mr Simister has now resigned, but as he has done so within six months of the coming District Council elections in May 2019, there cannot be a by-election. Apparently he resigned because of the behaviour of his fellow conservatives on SODC. I think I saw our MP, John Howell, more often than I saw Mr Simister.

If you take an interest in local politics, you may recall that the number of district councillors were reduced before the last election. Instead a local person representing us, it was someone from Harpsden who had to represent not only Goring Heath and Whitchurch, but also Mapledurham and Kidmore End. The reason put forward for the reduction of the number of councillors was to save money on councillors allowances, as fewer councillors meant less allowances. Unsurprisingly, straight after the election the Conservatives then increased the amount of the allowance paid to each councillor, so that there was no saving at all, as the same amount in total was paid to fewer people.

Come May 2nd, there is going to be another election, and perhaps now is the time for some changes.

As background to the Councils efforts to reduce the speed limit I thought it worthwhile to research the history of the 40 mph speed limit and the consequences for Crays Pond residents.

Prior to 1930 the national speed limit was 20 mph, with the 1930 Road Traffic Act speed limits for cars was done away with entirely, then on the 18th March 1935 with a new Act and after five years of having completely derestricted roads and much carnage, the British government introduced a 30 mph speed limit in built-up areas. For over twenty years, 30 mph had been the only road speed limit in the British Isles, although during the war years a 20 mph limit was applied at night.

Built-up areas were defined as roads having continuous street lighting in the approaches to towns and villages. The practice continued after the war, by the mid-1950s British towns and cities had developed significantly compared to 30 years earlier. Main roads were of much higher standard, and it was clear that, while the speed limit on these roads remained at 30 mph, speeds of around 40 mph were commonplace without any particular safety problem.

Rather than enforce inappropriate 30 limits, the government regularised the situation by introducing a new speed limit of 40 mph on suitable thoroughfares. This was only intended for high-quality outer-suburban roads, although it could also be applied to other roads with suitable characteristics, I have not been able to confirm the exact date when 40 mph limits were introduced but evidence suggests its is through the Road Traffic Act 1956. The 70 mph for motorways took effect on the 22nd December 1965.

In the early part of the 90's, the then Conservative government withdrew the requirement for local highway authorities to gain the approval of the Department of Transport before changes to main road speed limits. This in effect gave them the freedom to act without a consistency requirement.

In consequence the change of 40 mph limits has not always been done in a fair and dependable manner. It has been suggested that highway authorities have generally not fully assessed their roads to see which what benefits would ensue, less accidents, lower pollution, and 10% less noise with a lower limits. They have responded in a piecemeal manner to proven fatalities and major accidents and complaints from local residents, shunts and minor accidents being seemingly under reported because of insurance penalties for the participants, hence these important factors are discounted by local road authorities when deciding new limits.

The 30 MPH Speed Limit for Crays Pond is nearly here.

The parish council and many supporters have put in sustained efforts to have the speed limit through Crays Pond reduced to 30MPH and after a site meeting with two officials from OCC our request was accepted and the lower limit is to be introduced. This limit will apply to the B471 and B4526.

This latest attempt started with a 'logic document' presented to OCC which was based on the Dept for Transport Circular 01/2013 with its 30MPH-default limit through villages subject to various conditions – the requirements were met fully. The issue on our being the only village to have a higher limit can only be explained as an oversight. Those officials are now following the process to ensure the various parts of traffic and road regulations are followed and that the new signs are sited correctly. I will update you when I know more. Enforcement is always an issue so be assured it is being attended to.

We must thank the council for championing this long-standing cause and the many people who wrote in to support the request. Our safety is improved, statistically, there should be fewer accidents with lower noise and reduced pollution but, overall, we will feel safer. People power does work!

A packed Goring Heath Parish Hall was the venue for the now famous 'Mike Holland's Quiz night' on the 9th February.






