Chairman's Comments

It has been an encouraging month in our community. From the perspective of your Parish Council, we have made progress in two key areas – closer engagement between the Parish Council and our parishioners to ensure we better represent your views and a number of actions we have authorised to help maintain and improve the community

As regards engagement, it has been reassuring to see a steady flow of emails and letters from you. Also, we have now included at the beginning of each Parish Council meeting a 15-minute open forum, where you are all welcome to come along and share your concerns and views. Over the last three meetings we have had the pleasure of meeting several of you and covered a diverse range of topics such as the placing of promotional posters, traffic speed, inappropriate use of natural woodland and protection of bridleways. Do feel free to come along and say hello.

In terms of activities, firstly a big thank you to Amanda and Bill for the excellent refurbishment of the telephone box at Crays Pond. They did a super job and based on feedback from you, we will continue to use this as a community library. Then over the coming months you will see a number of other things happening, including addressing the excessive tree growth at Crays Pond as well as maintenance of the pond itself, and the resurfacing the car park at the Parish Hall. We have also approved a new specification for grass cutting for the community from next April and this is now going out to tender. There is of course still much to do including pressurising the County Council to get on with speed reduction at Crays Pond, other traffic management requirements at the Long Toll junction and in Whitchurch Hill, and the future of the White Lion pub. We will keep you posted.

Life as a councillor

I have found it really interesting being a District Councillor, meeting lots of new people, and hearing different perspectives.

Last night, October 10, I was at the long awaited full Council meeting. where there was a proposal to withdraw the existing local plan and do a new one, based on the electoral promises made before the May elections, which had resulted in a change of control. As at the full Council meeting in July, the room was packed with people who had turned out to see the District Council in action, and I now make a point of talking to as many of the watchers on the side as I can. It's pretty easy to see what position someone supports, so while giving a cheery welcome to the tweed clad or banner waving supporters of the new council, I aim for the suits. Almost unfailingly, these are property consultants, from all the big names, and they are happy to reveal which companies they represent, and the sites that they are itching to develop; Carter Jonas, West Waddy, Barton Willmore and many others crowd the room. They tell me about their plans, such as the Culham new town which, one of them tells me, has the great advantage over rival sites by having a railway station. I forbear to tell the sharp suited young man that the one train an hour Culham station could hardly handle a fraction of the new population of 6,000 he envisages for his new town. So far, I have not met any ordinary people who have turned out at these meetings and who want the houses that the developers are proposing. Although I live in hope of meeting someone who is desperate to buy a new build executive house with four beds and two bathrooms, I never do; perhaps they are actually all quite happy tucked up in their current homes in London.

Away from the heat and passion of the full council, where horns lock along party lines, we councillors also have to adjudicate on taxi licensing, and here, where just three councillors form a panel, things are very harmonious. The responsibility of the panel is to adjudicate as to whether, in the language of the rather arcane legislation, applicants are "fit and proper" to be taxi drivers. Points on the licence, complaints from the public, court appearances and notification from other local authorities can all count in the making of the assessment of fit and proper. We hear details of people's lives and circumstances, and the background to incidents, and, like a jury, we have to sift the evidence and make a judgement that can ensure that the public will be safe to use a taxi driven by the applicant. In the making these judgement, we often reveal our own basic views and opinions, and realise that whatever our political beliefs, we share a common humanity.

Help needed checking Hartslock sheep

Would you be keen to have a weekly walk on a beautiful nature reserve to help us check our sheep?

For those of you who are not familiar with it, Hartslock Nature Reserve is a beautiful south facing slope of chalk



grassland, located approximately a mile west of Whitchurch Hill along the bridleway to Gatehampton and Goring. Rich in wildflowers and butterflies, Hartslock is managed by The Berks, Bucks, and Oxon Wildlife Trust and known for its rare orchids and stunning views over the River Thames.

Mainly carried out by teams of volunteers and our lovely flock of sheep, we do a lot of work at Hartslock to keep the habitats in tip top condition. Tasks including clearing areas of encroaching scrub and brambles, maintaining pathways, gates and fences, and managing the vegetation. The sheep are a very important part of our team, grazing the grassland and encroaching scrub. Chalk grassland characteristically has shallow soils, lime rich, nutrient poor, with short vegetation. The flora and fauna at Hartslock thrive due to this and the carefully timed grazing and management.

We currently have a very friendly flock of Hebridean sheep at Hartslock, but we also use Shetland and Beulah sheep. These are hardy traditional breeds, all used to being out in all conditions, and grazing steep slopes.

The livestock are checked on a daily basis by a rota of kind volunteers, and at least once a week by BBOWT staff. Our stockwatchers are invaluable, without them we would be unable to carry out the essential grazing management on our nature reserves. A stockwatcher's main aim is to make sure the animals are all there, looking well, and are secure within the reserve with sufficient water. Stockwatchers generally commit to one day a week as part of a rota. Checks need to be carried out in daylight with at least 2 hours daylight remaining in order for us to respond to a livestock emergency.

We are currently looking for extra help, so if this appeals to you, please get in touch so we can discuss more details. No previous experience needed, and we will go through a full induction on site.

Waste and Recycling

Oxfordshire residents are among the very best in the country at recycling. Over 57 per cent of all waste is reused, composted or recycled, compared to the national rate of 45 per cent. 70 per cent of all waste is treated, processed or disposed of within Oxfordshire.

Food waste is taken to plants near Bicester, Cassington or Wallingford. The plants turn the food waste into high quality compost and soil conditioner for local farms, and capture the methane given off by the food to generate electricity for the National Grid – enough for around 9,000 homes!

Waste that can't be recycled is taken to Ardley Energy Recovery Facility near Bicester where it is burnt to produce electricity. Enough to power about 53,000 homes.

It is illegal to send any electrical items to landfill because they contain hazardous materials. Electrical items are also not permitted at <u>Ardley Energy Recovery Facility</u>. They are sent to a reprocessor where everything within an appliance is converted back to its component parts, such as plastic and metal, for recycling.

All colours of glass bottles and jars are collected together and then separated using hi tech optical sorting equipment that can sort 10 tonnes every hour. Glass bottles and jars are broken into small pieces and washed to have any paper or metal tops removed, and then melted in a furnace and used to make new glass products or road surfaces. Glass can be recycled an unlimited number of times without the quality being reduced.

Metal is melted in a furnace and used to make new metal products such as cans, or even aeroplane parts. By recycling metal we can save energy and natural resources. Recycling metal uses only 5% of the energy making new products would use. Aluminium is recycled into a new can less than 6 weeks later.

To recycle card, water is added to make a pulp and ink is removed. It can then be used to make corrugated card and boxes for the packaging industry.

Paper is recycled in a similar way to card, and is then used to make newspaper and other paper products. Paper can be recycled into a newspaper within seven days.

Plastic is washed and sorted into different types of plastic in the UK, and then sold to plastic manufacturers internationally to be made into both new plastic products and even things like fleece jackets! Recycling one plastic bottle saves enough energy to run a 60 watt lightbulb for six hours.

The value of professional tree care and arboriculture

We are all aware of the well documented damage and deforestation of the Amazon rainforest, the so called 'lungs of the earth'. As we all know, the process of photosynthesis is vital for the production of Oxygen and therefore important for us as humans.

Although this may appear to be of small significance, the correct advice, pruning and care of our own trees is necessary. Too often, unnecessary work is recommended or work is completed to a poor standard.

One of the most common failures is poor pruning work, also known as stub cutting, which will result in far more long-term damage including dead wood, decay and entry points for other pathogens. Poor practice is when branches are removed and not cut to a suitable growth point which should be based on the size of the wound created and species. Therefore, when considering your own tree pruning work, be sure not to base your decision only on recommendations and value for money but the professional qualifications and quality of the work. A simple way to assess this for yourself is to check that any branch that is pruned or reduced is cut back to another side branch (twig) and not just to any point on the main branch to 'make it look nice'. Pruning in this way ensures that the tree naturally heals, which does not occur when a branch is cut at a random point.

A widely held misconception is that a tree surgeon and an arborist are the same role, when in fact, although a tree surgeon may be able to cut the tree, an arborist will have far greater knowledge and understanding of a tree's 'mechanics'.

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
