#### Chairman's Comments

#### **Investing in our community**

As you might be aware, a small proportion of your Council Tax bill is allocated for the Parish Council to manage on behalf of our community. For those of you technically minded, this is named the Precept. The Parish Council has recently debated the level



that the Precept should be set at for the 2020-21 financial year commencing in April, and after several years of this remaining flat, the Council has decided that it is sensible for us to increase the level slightly. We feel it important that if we are going to ensure Goring Heath remains such a pleasant place to live, that we must invest appropriately in our community assets as well improve standards of the day to day upkeep of our Parish.

To put this in perspective, the Precept, will increase next year from £23,000 to £26,000, that is around £6 per household per annum. Full details of our budget are available for you to view on the Parish Council website, but initiatives we are investing in include upgrading the Parish Hall car park, an improved grass cutting specification and expenditure on signage to support the anticipated reduction in the speed limit at Crays Pond. I hope you will agree that this all makes sense. We are happy to discuss this at any time – or of course at our annual general meeting planned for the evening of 9<sup>th</sup> April.

And whilst speaking of investing in our community, I am delighted to see the formation of the Goring Heath Conservation Group, a team of volunteers who will be regularly meeting to work on a number of conservation activities. A big thank you for those of you getting involved – and more volunteers always welcome.

#### **Comments by District Councillor**

Life on the District Council is interesting at the moment; the issue of the Local Plan is one that has not gone away. Although the election in May last year brought into office many people who had clearly stated their opposition to the new Local Plan, the government has overruled the new council. The Secretary of State has threatened to take away the District Council's planning powers and pass them to the County Council. You will have seen just how much new housing is already being built in Benson and Wallingford, and there are already more houses to be built in Didcot, Crowmarsh and Watlington, but the new plan envisaged even more. Are these new houses really being built to meet local need or is it for some other reason?

The design for the new office at Crowmarsh to replace the old one that was destroyed by arson has now been revealed, and it follows the outcome of the public consultation that was carried out last Spring. The cost has increased from the original estimates, but as the building was destroyed over five years ago, that is hardly surprising. Over those years, a significant amount has been spent on renting office space, and there is no realistic alternative to rebuilding on the same site. It is planned that the new offices will be occupied by April 2022. Local residents with a long memory will recall that, a few years ago, it was proposed that the old office was demolished anyway and rebuilt because it was so badly designed and difficult to run. While that idea was abandoned, it does demonstrate that building poor quality offices on the cheap is not really value for money.

#### ADOPT A SAPLING OR 10?

The Great & the Good are making great claims about planting millions of trees to combat climate change. Only, there is one small problem once they have done that. Keeping them alive.

In our own small way, we are trying to manage our Great Oaks Wood to provide not only beautiful woodland, but help capture carbon. Having thinned out some of the mainly conifers, we are replanting with native hardwoods. With help from Martin Wise & friends, by the time you read this, we should have planted some 600 saplings.

My worry is keeping them alive so that they will actually grow & mature. I just wondered if any parishioners would like to help, mainly by keeping an eye on them, and help water them through their first year or two? I am not quite sure how this might work, possibly having a communal watering session once a week, or allocate a few trees to keep an eye, eg when out for a walk.

It would be a learning experience for us all, and could be interesting to see what we could make work for successful sapling survival.

#### Footways in the Parish

Over the past years the Parish Council (PC) has spent a considerable sum on the establishment and maintenance of footways alongside the B471, effectively from the War Memorial to Shervell's Hill.

Whilst there are some sections that are less than ideal (from the Hatchgate northwards to the Rec and from St John's to Cherry Mount), overall, these footways allow reasonably safe walking along the length of the 'main' road.

It is worth noting that these are NOT Public Footpaths or Bridleways but part of the Highway and subject to the same legislation as the carriageway itself. This means that obstruction of the footway is in effect no different to obstruction of the road in terms of the Law. As part of the Highway these footways are not marked on Ordnance Survey maps

This clearly puts responsibility for keeping the hedges clear of the footway on the adjoining Landowners who ARE responsible for THEIR hedges. The Highway Authority are empowered, in the last resort, to cut the hedges and invoice the relevant landowner for the work....an expensive option I would imagine. The Parish Council urges relevant landowners to take responsibility for maintaining their hedges where they obstruct the footways.

The PC hopes to develop new mowing regimes for parts of the verges along which our footways run, resulting in increased bio-diversity and making walking them an even greater pleasure.

This process of regularly harvesting poles from regrown stumps (*stools* in woodland vernacular) has kept a supply of wood available for firewood, construction and a host of greenwood products used on the farms, in the home and gardens.

By choosing products from our native woodlands, one supports this industry and the fantastic habitats that coppicing creates.

#### A Plastic-free Cuppa

96 per cent of tea drinkers use tea bags. Many of the popular brands use a bag construction that uses oil-based plastics in either the bag material or the sealant that holds it together. The use of these materials renders the bag non-biodegradable or recyclable. There is also evidence to suggest that these materials release plastic nano-particles into the beverage.

Should you wish to avoid the possibility of ingesting these nano-particles, and contributing to the weight of plastic pollution. Then you might be interested to know the brands that are plastic free.

The PLASTIC-FREE brands are - Abel & Cole (Delivery Scheme), Clipper, Co-Op Own brand 99, Pukka Herbs, Teapigs, Twinings Pyramid Range and Waitrose Duchy Range.

Those TO AVOID are - PG Tips. Tetley, Twinings 'heat-sealed' and 'string and tag', Yorkshire and Lidl own brand.

Of course, the best way is to make your cuppa with loose leaf tea. It really is no more time consuming and makes NICER tea.

#### **Subject: What should farmers grow on their land?**

As a "mixed" farm (Cattle, Crops & Countryside) we really do not know which way we should be heading, now.

For the first 30 years after World War 2 it was easy, produce as much food, as efficiently as possible, for home consumption. Government directed us by using "Deficiency Payments" (guaranteeing minimum payments) to get us to grow what was needed. On joining the EEC, the policy continued, but using "Intervention" buying into storage. Sadly this was too successful, as it continued too long, and Europe found itself with excess surpluses in expensive storage. Farmers were then paid to "Setaside" land - i.e. not produce from it - & this has continued under various names, to this day. Currently it is called "Environmental Focus Area" - meaning we have to take >5% &/or obey other rules, as part of the annual Basic Payment. Farming is lucky to break even, so the Basic Payment for me is a big part of our farm's profit. We have a beef herd (currently plagued with TB), arable crops, some for energy production, but not Oil Seed Rape, because of uncontrollable pests, since a pesticide ban. We were in Environmental Schemes, but these have become so complicated, with erratic payments, that we have not rejoined.

Half the world is starving, & the other half has surplus, cheap (to them) food. Crops are the most efficient food source, but animal meat provides better quality proteins. Ruminants (cattle & sheep) can eat grass (absorbing CO2) that grows on land that cannot be cropped, and again supply top quality food, but they also produce high levels of CO2 equivalents. Pigs & Poultry are the most efficient forms of meat production, but require better quality foods, e.g. soya beans, grown on arable land.

Rain Forests are the "lungs of the world". It is nonsense to fell these forests to plant arable crops. It should be made more profitable to their owners to keep them, rather than clear them. I believe it takes decades (if not centuries) to grow back an acre of woodland that absorbs as much CO2 as an acre of existing Rain Forest. But if we plant trees on our arable fields, where will our food crops be grown?

As I say, I want to do the right thing, and still provide a living for my family. What should I grow on my farm?

Our Annual General Meeting was held on Thursday 20th February where we heard from respected Oxford historian, Mark Davies about the extraordinary story of a humble pastry cook in Oxford who was one of the pioneers of aeronautics. He was the first Englishman to fly in a balloon, ascending from Oxford in October 1784, a journey that lasted six miles. He went on to fly longer distances, and even helped a Mrs Sage to become the first British female balloonist. Despite landing in the sea on two occasions, he lived to 72 years old. On Saturday 15th February we ran the coffee shop, raising money to buy the Victoria County History volume on our area when it is published. 
