Chair's comments

And we also had the end of a mini era with the change of Prime Minister, which will have a greater impact on our lives given the change of emphasis in the policies which have been announced so far.

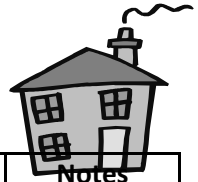
These events both at home and abroad have taken place against a backdrop of a very hot summer. Whilst it would be possible to ignore events going on in other countries, or the change of monarch if one is a republican, it is hard to ignore our sad looking countryside as it was in August. We are not used to such heat, coupled with such low rainfall, but sadly this may be the future. Although we are a small parish, we can try to make some changes to the way we carry on our daily life that help to reduce our carbon footprint. Many small changes add up!

As a council we do not have much opportunity to be 'greener' but we have taken one initiative this year. You may have noticed that some of our road verges and other green spaces have been left to grow long over the summer to encourage wild flowers and grasses to flourish. These provide both a habitat and source of food for a myriad of insects, and it also reduces the amount of petrol required for mowing.

If you have any ideas of how we as a council can operate in a greener way do get in touch. Our District Council are actively pursuing a green agenda, but let's keep the pressure on them to keep getting greener. They may be battling against policies coming out of central government, so they will need all the backing of their local population that we can give them!

New defibrillator

After recent discussions regarding the siting of one of the defibrillators and after written confirmation from the owners, the decision was made to install one at The Sun Pub where it will be installed soon.

OCC can use cameras to enforce traffic restrictions in Oxfordshire

OCC has obtained government permission to use cameras to enforce traffic regulations, including stopping in yellow box junctions, illegal turns, and vehicle restrictions. Automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) cameras will be fitted around specific locations in Oxfordshire. While these measures have been welcomed by some, concern has been expressed by civil liberty groups, trade associations and motoring organisations. These cameras are NOT available to enforce new 20mph limits.

District Councillor Comments**Oxford Congestion Plans**

Those of you with long memories, and who take an interest in these matters, will recall that about 50 years ago there was a proposal to “solve” Oxford’s traffic “problem” by building a road across Christchurch meadow, linking the Abingdon Road to the Plain. This proposal created such a furore that it was abandoned, and Oxford then became the first place in the UK to set up a Park and Ride system as an alternative solution to traffic congestion. Down here, although it could be said that we live in “North Readingshire” as much as in South Oxfordshire, Oxford is still a place we go to for many things, and there are now proposals to make further changes to the traffic management system there. Although Oxford has an excellent bus service, the buses are often held up by other traffic, and this can make the bus service erratic and unreliable, and so there are three schemes under consideration to reduce congestion and improve air quality.

First is a system of traffic filters that will limit the number of vehicles at certain key points, with essential users having exemption and local residents given a number of free passes. There will be ANPR systems to identify who can or cannot enter, with financial penalties for transgressors.

Along with this scheme, which is now out for consultation, there is a proposal for a Zero Emission Zone. Vehicle emissions are the main source of air pollution in Oxford. This zone goes from about Oxford station to Magdalen Bridge and from Norham Gardens down to St Ebbes.

Finally, a work place parking levy is proposed, covering a much wider area than the other two schemes, essentially encompassing all Oxford with the ring roads. Again this is to address traffic congestion and air quality by making it less financially attractive to drive to work in Oxford when there are other alternatives for many people.

The details of all these schemes are on the Oxfordshire County Council website under **Central Oxfordshire Travel Plan**, with links to the consultation process.

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Waste and Bins

One service that the District Council does every week for us all is collecting the rubbish. The waste collection service is a mark of a civil society, and seeing pictures of overseas places where there is no service makes one appreciate it all the more.

In the bad old days, all waste was dumped into landfill, but now very little from our District goes to landfill. The black bin contents are taken to the Ardley incinerator, which you can see to the west of the M40 just north of the A34 junction. This is a sophisticated operation and the most complicated part of it is the process of cleaning the smoke and gases from the incineration. Our food and garden compost goes to the plant near Benson by the A4074, and this Anaerobic Digester plant composts everything down to create gas for energy and fertiliser for agriculture. The third part of our waste is glass, cans, paper and some plastics and this should go in the green bin. The loads are taken to a local transfer station where it is tipped out and scanned by a small team for non-recyclable items that shouldn't be there, such as black bags, food waste, nappies and textiles. From the transfer station, recycling goes to a Material Recovery Facility in Edmonton, North London. When it arrives, the recycling is scanned for levels of contamination (non-recyclable items). If the recycling is too contaminated the facility will reject it, and the whole lorry load of recycling will be wasted.

If the recycling is clean and made up of the correct items, it is loaded onto a system which separates the different materials. These are then processed and sold on to companies both in the UK and overseas to be made into new items.

It is really important that only the correct items are put in the recycling bin, and if in doubt put it in the black bin. However, food waste should not go in the black bin. I was surprised to learn that when the SODC waste team rummaged through a sample of black bins, it was found that up to 10% of the waste in the black bins should have been in the food waste bin.

South Oxfordshire has one of the highest recycling rates in the country at 63.6% (2020/21), a rate only exceeded by St Albans at 64.2%. However, these figures include organic waste, ie garden and food, which make up 55.7% of our total recycled waste.

Unlike some other authorities, such as Reading, we also accept glass bottles in the recycling bin; these must add quite a bit of weight to our recycling levels. Making recycling work is something that is up to each of us, and while the Council can facilitate it, our high rate is a tribute to residents as much as the Council.

Goring Allotments Charity

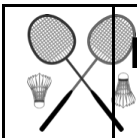

CRAYS POND GORING HEATH COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

We are looking for keen volunteers to help keep our community safe.
 Fatalities are four times more likely to happen in rural areas than in
 Urban areas—Do you want to help?



The Crays Pond Goring Heath Community Speedwatch Group (CSW) supported by Goring Heath Parish Council has been recently established to tackle speeding in our community following the reduction in the speed limit through Crays Pond on the B4526 and B471. During August, 2022 the CSW Team formally reported 32 speeding vehicles to Thames Valley Police (TVP) with the highest recorded speed being 51 mph in a 30 mph area. We currently have five police approved sites—two in Crays Pond and three in Whitchurch Hill. CSW operatives are there to record and report for educational purposes in the hope that drivers will in future respect the speed limits. The scheme works under the operating principles of Community Speedwatch UK which is a not-for-profit social enterprise that provides support for Speedwatch groups throughout the country. The scheme can provide communities with initial loan equipment and training to monitor speeding in their area. This is organised by the Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner, via the local police, in our case TVP who are very supportive of the initiative.

Aims of the scheme

To allow trained volunteers to address speed concerns in their local community by:

1. Undertaking high-visibility roadside operations to educate speeding drivers, with a view to improving driver behaviour.
2. Reporting details of speeding vehicles to the Police in specific areas where speed is of concern. These speed monitoring reports enable the police to;

- Send advisory letters to the registered owners advising them that their speed at which their vehicle was travelling was in excess of the speed limit.

Use the data gathered to inform Police and others on the allocation of resources and general road safety issues and targeted enforcement activity.

3. Delivering locally based feedback and problem-solving schemes where speeding is of specific concern to the Community.
4. Speedwatch is not enforcement. It is about raising awareness of speeding within communities and educating drivers.

Langtree School 2022 Results Information



Langtree School is thrilled to report outstanding achievements by our students in their qualifications this summer.

Despite the huge challenges the students have faced, they have collectively achieved the highest results in the school's history! Our **attainment 8 score of 56.6** is Langtree's best result from examinations since this measure was introduced in 2016. **83% of students achieved 5 or more GCSEs including English and maths at grade 4 or above and 67% achieved 5 or more GCSEs including English and maths at grade 5 or above.**

It can be invidious to name students who did extremely well as so many of our students achieved, or even exceeded, the extremely high targets we set for them. Nevertheless, students such as Thomas (eight 9s, one 8, two 7s), Louis (six 9s, three 8s, two 7s), Ivy (seven 9s, three 8s, one 7), Sydney (five 9s, five 8s), Lloyd (eight 9s, three 7s) deserve a special mention. Also to be especially commended are Ben, Lydia, Ella, Louise, Ollie, Ella and Rebecca all of whom achieved 10 or more GCSEs at grade 7 and above. The staff at Langtree are so proud of so many students, and it is impossible to list them all individually, however, particular recognition is much deserved by the many students who worked extremely hard and exceeded their targets and predictions, including:

Angus, Lilly, Frank, Toby, Charlie, Ben, Ella, Lucas, Betsy, Saskia, Floss, Izzy and Ed. All of these students achieved high grades, and generally exceeded even the highly aspirational targets their teachers set them - and in all cases they significantly surpassed the progress expected of them based on their prior attainment.

Simon Bamford, the head teacher of Langtree School, said: "We are immensely proud of all the work and achievements of our students, especially after such a difficult and disrupted time. They have shown such resilience, creativity and integrity to achieve these outstanding results. Our staff have worked tirelessly to ensure that our students achieved the very best grades they were capable of and are all able to progress onto further education and study. We look forward to hearing about all their future successes."

Remembrance Service— Sunday 13th November

Every year there is a Service of Remembrance at the War Memorial. (B471 on the hill between Whitchurch and Whitchurch Hill). It is an opportunity to remember the Armed Forces, and their families, from Britain and the Commonwealth, the vital role played by the emergency services and those who have lost their lives as a result of conflict or terrorism.

The road is closed between 10.45 and 11.15 to allow wreaths to be laid. All are welcome at the Service.



On traffic...

The application to Oxfordshire County Council to reduce the speed limit on roads within the Whitchurch Hill Triangle (bounded by Goring Heath Road, Hill Bottom and the B471) has been submitted, as discussed in previous newsletters. The application did not include the B471 itself, as the speed limit on it is currently 40 mph and such roads are outside the scope of Oxfordshire's "20 is plenty" initiative.

The Parish Council is, however, firmly of the opinion that the 40 mph limit is inappropriate on the B471 given the presence of village amenities and housing on or close to the road. Separate to the Parish Council's activities, a resident has written to Andrew Gant, Cabinet Member for Highway Management at Oxfordshire, raising this issue, providing a detailed rationale for a reduction in the speed limit on the B471.

The Parish Council have written to the County Council in support. Any parishioner with views on these issues is invited to email the Parish Council at the address on the back of this newsletter.
