## Chair's Comments

This month one of our Goring Heath Parish Councillors has passed a remarkable milestone.

Martin Wise has been on the council continuously for forty years. That's a lot of meetings – about four hundred and forty! During that period, he has seen many others come and go. None displaying his superior staying powers. It is really good to have someone on the council who knows the area so well, and has dealt with so many problems- many of which recur at regular intervals.

Martin is very interested and knowledgeable about the impact of climate change and other environmental problems such as the decrease in insects, and steers us towards making more environmentally friendly choices for the parish. As a result, the parish areas that we have control over such as the grass verges and the two ponds are being looked after in as wildlife friendly way as possible. Last summer we left some of the verges to grow longer to encourage more wildflowers to grow and provide food for the shrinking insect pollution. All suggestions from Martin.

This year we are embarking on an ambitious project to revitalize the pond at Crays Pond and stop it reverting to land as all ponds will eventually do. We are lucky that Martin has not rested on his laurels after forty years but is still enthusiastically project managing this improvement. This involves not only the planning of the work, liaison with contractors and keeping an eye on the work, but also the laborious job of applying for various grants to cover the not inconsiderable cost of the project.

Forty years of service is not compulsory for us mere mortals. Most of us only serve for a few years but all contributions to the smooth running of the parish are greatly valued. We are currently looking for someone to replace a recently resigned Councillor. What are you waiting for? Come and join the team- no experience needed, just enthusiasm. Contact our clerk to get involved.

From one long serving member of the team to a very new member. This month we welcome Louise Shearer, who is our new newsletter editor. This is her first magazine, so I hope you all find something useful and interesting to read. A big thank you to Louise for taking on this exciting opportunity in journalism- no pay but lots of appreciation from all who take the trouble to read these pages, and especially the Parish Council.

I also want to give a big thank you to Ian Reynolds who has been running the Community Speed Watch Programme on behalf of the council. Ian has been doing all the preparation and paperwork, helped by a small team of volunteers. Unfortunately, his team has reduced in number and he now desperately needs some more helpers.

## **Planning**

We would like to point out that No Strong Views is one of only three choices that SODC gives the parish council. It does not illustrate tacit approval of an application. Typically, it is supplemented with specific comments from the parish council highlighting areas of concern.

## **Crays Pond Restoration**

In 2022 GHPC commissioned Gareth Matthes, a Wetland Ecology Consultant, to look at the habitat in and around the pond with reference to Rod D'Ayala's similar surveys from 2010 and 2014.

His resulting report made recommendations about measures to restore the habitat and improve it for increased biodiversity. It is the intention of GHPC to implement these measures over the course of 2023.

The plan is to completely remove the mature Weeping Willow to the west of the pond and replace it with three *Sorbus aucuparia* (Rowan). The existing tree offers very little habitat value and transpires vast amounts of water from the pond.

Then there will be arboricultural work to allow access by machinery that will remove a large quantity of silt and sediment. Also, the 'island' of vegetation and up to 50 per cent of the marginal vegetation will be removed.

Other work will include the removal of Sallow (*Salix caprea*) scrub from the pond itself and coppicing of the Sallow on the western margin. Also, a standing dead oak on the eastern margin is to be stabilised by strapping to a healthy neighbour. This dead tree offers great potential for Bat roosts.

Whilst the public always has access to the whole pond area we do not intend the creation of clear paths. The PC has a policy of prioritising this whole habitat as a space for wildlife primarily.

Our Grant Applications will be made in the spring with the intention of beginning the work in late summer/autumn when water levels are lowest.

## **District Councillor's Commentary**

As I write this, the District Council is about to approve its budget for the coming year. This will be fourth budget of the current Green and Lib Dem administration at SODC, and this time we are within spitting distance of a completely balanced budget.



Although the principles set out by Mr Micawber in David Copperfield are difficult to follow completely in the arcane world of local government finance, and the budget deficit this coming year is £673,000, that is a great deal less than it was a few years ago.

We can look smugly at other Local Authorities such as Thurrock, Croydon and Slough where what Michael Gove has described as “significant failures in their local leadership, governance and financial management” has led to debts of hundreds of millions of pounds resulting in Council Tax rises of up to 15%.

In South Oxfordshire, we have not indulged in speculative investments, and over the last four years we have taken key finance functions back in house from Capita, as well as other activities which had been outsourced. With finance back in house, we have had a better handle on our budgets, and improved our revenue collection and had significantly better financial reporting which has reduced the cost of the external audit and enabled managers to manage more efficiently.

We are also now benefiting from the recent increase in interest rates on our investments which were last reported as £179 million, some £25 million more than 4 years previously.

A strengthened financial position has also enabled the Council to do the good things it was elected to do; aided by a grant from government, we are replacing the gas heating at the Cornerstone Arts Centre in Didcot with air sourced heat pumps and solar panels, with projected annual saving of £20,000. We are responding to the difficulty people on low incomes have in finding homes by starting a social housing project, and we have numerous initiatives to reduce our carbon footprint across the District.

In May, there will be local elections, and I am sure that everyone will be keen to take part in our precious local democracy.

One change this year is that to stamp down on the voter fraud that is apparently endemic, if you want to vote in person you have to bring along voter ID to the Polling Station.

For most people this is a passport, photo driving licence or bus pass, but for the young who have yet to travel or drive, or older people who may have given up foreign travel and surrendered a driving licence, the choice is to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate or to request a postal vote. However, you can use an out-of-date passport or driving licence etc so long as it looks like you.

He was working as a trainee financial advisor at Orchard House Independent Financial Advisors in Henley since February last year.

Lewis was so very highly thought of by all who knew him, he worked hard and had huge enthusiasm for so many things. Every time I met him, I would be impressed by his polite and kind nature, and his lovely easy way of relating to everyone. Sarah and Taz have lived in the village for over 20 years, and contribute so much to the community. I know they have found comfort in the many messages and cards they have received from friends and neighbours, and by the huge numbers of flowers and tributes that have been left at the scene of the accident.


## Whitchurch Hill Recreation Ground Play Equipment

The Whitchurch Hill village fete made a welcome return to the parish in 2022 after a two-year hiatus because of the Covid pandemic. The fete has been a landmark event in parish life for many decades. And in some senses, it is still as it was so many years ago. As one parishioner, who has lived in Whitchurch Hill for many years told me, it is “a glimpse of how England used to be”.

Spread across the Whitchurch Hill recreation ground you will find: a variety of stalls selling crafts, food and many more things beside; amusements (that don't involve electronics); tea tent; children's races; brass band; barbeque; beer tent; and by tradition at the end of the fete, the egg throwing competition. This year, to mark parish councillor Martin Wise's 40 years of service on the council, the prize will be an egg-shaped trophy to be presented by Martin.

For many years, the organisation of the fete has been led by Theresa and Nick Elsome, together with John Gray. But they have decided to retire from service and hand the baton onto another. Yes, in February 2023, Woodcote Volunteers was 40 years old! What an amazing milestone and such a credit to the people of Woodcote and surrounding villages who have kept this much needed service going for so long. We are run by volunteers only, who serve on the committee, as drivers and manage the office.

We held a celebratory event on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> February in the Village Hall for our current and past volunteers, clients and others who support us in a variety of ways.

### Goals for 2023

Our goal for 2023 is to try to increase our pool of volunteer drivers from the current 34 to 40! We are becoming increasingly busy and our valiant team of drivers are getting a bit stretched!

If you would like to give something back to your community, and feel a huge sense of satisfaction by helping others, why don't you consider offering a few hours each month as a driver?

Our drivers always comment on how much they enjoy volunteering this way, as they can chat to some lovely people while driving, and at the same time make a huge difference to people locally, who say they cannot imagine how they would manage without us.

You don't have to commit to any specific days or hours – we call you and if you are free to take the job, great; if not, that's no problem. You can choose how far and where you are prepared to drive – we especially need volunteers to take local people to hospitals in Reading and Oxford - but if you don't want to drive that far, we have many requests for drivers to take clients to local towns and villages. Even if you can do just one drive a month, that would be wonderful. Your expenses are paid at the current government-set rate of 45p per mile.

Our only requirements are that you have a DBS check, undertake some simple training, your car is taxed, insured and MOT'd (if applicable) and that you have a genuine interest in helping people.

In 2022, we began to introduce a few changes that we believe will reduce risk and keep our clients as safe and comfortable as possible.

We are providing safeguarding awareness training to all our drivers, and St John's Ambulance provided first aid awareness training in January. We have been given guidance from our local GPs as to what to do if a client falls. We have purchased a new, lightweight wheelchair so if a client is at risk of a fall, we can keep them safe by bringing this with us for the journey.

We have several organisational Blue Badges, allowing us to park close to the entrance of a building to reduce the distance a person needs to walk. This is very welcome when walking is uncomfortable or tiring.

We are very pleased to welcome Nikki to our team of volunteer drivers. Sadly, we have to say goodbye to Janet Page and Stephanie Waite, who are leaving us. Janet has been a driver with us for ten years and Stephanie helped in the office for over a year. Thank you so much and you will be missed.


