Chairman's Comments

I write this as the general election results are announced, with once again John Howell securing his place as our MP. It was good to see Mr Howell at our fete the other day, taking time out from knocking on doors to meet his constituents in a more relaxed environment. The fete is also a chance to meet your parish councillors, who amongst their other duties, man the barbecue stall.

It's not just at the fete however that you can meet your parish councillors, as the parish council meetings are open to the public, and we welcome anyone to come along. We are always interested to hear what people have to say, as we have our meetings in an informal and friendly way, and share local knowledge and background so that when the time comes we can make informed decisions.

The final news of the bus service changes were received too late for the last Newsletter, but it is great that the Going Forward company has taken up the challenge to provide a service to most of the parish, including Crays Pond, and so Thames Travel will be stopping the 143 from the end of June. Going Forward has already restored the Saturday service, and there are plans for a later daytime service. It's a quick and easy way to travel into Reading, or even just to pop down to Pangbourne, so I would urge everyone to give it a try.

It's also good news on the financial side, as while we had to set the Council Tax for the whole of this year to provide the subsidy to the 143, as it will not now be needed we will reduce the Council tax back down again next year.

War Memorial

Bus Service

After the threat of no buses at all, we currently have more buses passing though Whitchurch Hill than you can shake a stick at, although the situation will soon change as the Thames Travel 143 service is withdrawn.



The service from Going Forward is not subsidised, so does need support and usage. It now offers:

A service to Pangbourne that allows either about half an hour (morning) or an hour (afternoon) for shopping etc

A service to Reading that takes just 20 minutes to Caversham, 30 minutes to central Reading, and 25 minutes back. For Crays Pond, its just 15 minutes to and from Caversham.

Pangbourne service goes on to Goring Station via Streatley, 16 minutes

The service allows for a long period in Reading, or for the two services in the middle of the day about 40 minutes which is often just the time needed for some things like visits to the bank. There are also connecting services to Wallingford via Cleeve and South Stoke from Goring.

Fares are also very reasonable, less than the corresponding Thames Travel Fares, for example a return to Reading from the Sun is £5, child fare £2.50, single fares £3 to Reading. If you hold a Rail Card, ie Young Persons Rail Card, a return journey is free, so a return to Reading is just £3!

The bus company is also hoping to introduce a later service, leaving Reading at about 18:15, so making the service suitable for full time workers.

Photographs from Goring Heath Endowed School

Some photographs (reproduced on pages 16 and 17) have recently been discovered that depict scenes from a 1936 production of A Midsummer Night's Dream, acted by children from the Goring Heath Endowed School over three days in November.

The Headmaster at the time, J.H. Baker, worked there from 1924 until his retirement in 1947 when he moved to Rifleman Cottage in Shervells Hill. He was particularly keen to get pupils involved in enacting Shakespeare plays, believing that there was much to be learned from acting, scenery construction, costume making and working together. He wrote about his life in" A School on the Ground Floor". A photograph in the history society's archives, sent from Australia by Phyllis Wallis, shows a production of a Winter's Tale – could some of those mentioned also appear in these photograph?

John Baker was also known for his books on local history, writing about Whitchurch, Mapledurham, and two books on the Chilterns, "The Land of the Gap" and "The Ipsden Country". These are available for reference or loan at Woodcote Library.

The school was part of the foundation by Henry Allnutt in 1724 for almshouses and the education of local boys. Originally the school took place in the council chamber at the almshouses, but as numbers increased it was deemed unsuitable, and the church commissioners authorised a new building in 1877, together with a headmasters house. The school closed in 1985 and was converted into almshouse accommodation.

There are six photographs in total. Unfortunately space doesn't allow them all to be reprinted here, but if you'd like to see more, they will all be displayed on the 'Goring Heath Parish News' Facebook page. It would be very interesting to find out more about life at the school—if you have any memories of the school, please email goringheathnewsletter@gmail.com

With the support of Homeshare Oxford, based at Age UK Oxfordshire, four Oxford householders have welcomed a young professional or post-graduate student into their home.

The young professionals and students, who stay in the householder's spare room, are lending a hand with things like shopping, gardening and the odd bit of housework, preparing and sharing meals together with their householder, as well as getting out for walks and enjoying a chat and each other's company in the evenings. The Sharer also pays a modest contribution to the householders living costs to cover any increase in bills and council tax, so that the householder is not out of pocket.

We know that lots of householders in Oxford, usually aged 50-100, have a spare room. These householders could help young nurses, teachers and PhD students in their community, by providing accommodation, and enjoying some help and companionship in return.

Claire, the Manager of Homeshare Oxford, said: "We support our householders and sharers every step of the way, run any necessary police checks and references, and work hard to find fantastic matches where people share interests and values and will live happily together."

One of the Sharers, Eleanor, a student in Oxford said: "It is wonderful that my Householder had the trust and confidence to welcome me into her home – I feel very lucky to have found Homeshare. I would not be able to live in the city without it."

Claire added: "Some of our householders sleep much better knowing there is someone with them in the house, and our sharers are learning so much from our householder's life experience – often both the older and young people have felt lonely before, and Homesharing can bring happiness, light and life into those situations."



Senior Strength Training Circuit

As we grow older our body naturally starts to change and slow down. Our muscles lose mass, ligaments and tendons get stiffer, bones become less dense and more fragile, our heart is less able to send blood quickly around our body and our metabolic rate slows. Pea sticks and bean poles

Locally grown and cut pea sticks and bean poles are now available.

Pea sticks are essential for putting in amongst taller plants like delphiniums to keep them supported, as well as being perfect for sweet peas and, in the vegetable garden, peas and mangetout. Bean poles are essential for runner beans, and are also excellent for growing climbing french beans, so much easier than the dwarf variety.
